

# Dipa, Nandi make a bold statement

t was a magical evening as the new pin-up girl of Indian sport, Dipa Karmakar, and her long-time mentor, Bisheshwar Nandi on Friday had the delegates of the 39th National Convention of the Sports Journalists' Federation of India (SJFI) in rapt attention.

Taking part in the 'Storytelling' programme recalling her life as a gymnast prior to attaining stardom at the Rio Olympics, the 23-year-old Tripura girl was never in doubt about what she wanted to say. She spoke in a measured tone and left behind such a striking impression of being a sportsperson with a level head and the future challenges she is prepared to face and conquer.

Dipa also recalled an incident when she was really stumped when asked whether she was from Bangladesh, especially after having told the questioner that she hailed from Tripura. This she said happened at the first major event she took part . The fourth-placed finisher in women's vault at the recent Rio Olympics signed off with a flourish saying, "I am happy that on August 15 this year I made India watch gymnastics for more than an hour."

Dipa who was initiated to the sport at the age of seven by Nandi's wife and coach, Soma, was all praise of the support received by her from the Sports Authority of India (SAI), the Gymnastics Federation of India, her sponsors, GoSports Foundation and the Tripura Government. Still she maintained that the person she owed the most was her personal coach who like her parents sacrificed so much to helpher to get such a big stage like the Olympic Games.



"He is, of course, a tough taskmaster. But all the same a concerned person too, of my well-being and helping me stay fully focussed both during training and competitions. With him around, I am just left to concentrate on my routines and sharpening my skills. It was again under his tutelage that I did get to do 'produnova' which I think has had a major say in getting to where I am now."

#### "This is India"

Nandi, who spoke next, did not mince—words as he pointed out that India remained a country where you could gain recognition only if you got your act together. "This is India...to get something, you have to do some thing. To gain attention and recognition, one has to do something," he said matter-of-factly.

The Dronacharya-award winner said gymnastics had a great future if the States started promoting it vigoursly. Turning to the Odisha Sports Minister, Sudam Marandi, he urged the State government to recall his friend and colleague Ashok Mishra. "When he (Mishra) was around, Odisha was a force to reckon with in Indian gymnastics. But after he moved away to Kolkata, it has only left Odisha gymnastics in doldrums."


Terming his protégé's immense talent as something which cannot be measured even in terms of tonnes of gold, Nandi said that Dipa still had a long way to go. "If she remains focussed, we have in her a sure shot gold medal winner in Tokyo four years from now."

The SJFI, on its part, felicitated both Dipa and Nandi on making it to Bhubaneswar. A specially-designed Certificate of Excellence was awarded to Dipa besides a Sambalpuri shawl and a silver replica of the famous Chariot Wheel, while Nandi received a shawl and a memento.

### Three kudos to these heroes



Javelin thrower Devendra Jhajharia became the first Indian to clinch two gold medals at the Paralympics, when he bettered his own world record to clinch the top honours in the men's javelin throw F46 athletics event at the Rio Games. Devendra, who hails from Churu district of Rajasthan, won his previous gold at the 2004 Athens Games. He improved on the previous world mark of 62.15 metres (achieved in the 2004 Games), with an attempt of 63.97 metres at the Olympic Stadium (Engenhao).

The 35-year-old who is now employed by the Sports Authority of India as coach lost his left arm when he was nine in an electric shock.

From a district-level champion, he steadily moved up the ladder to compete at the state-level competitions and in 2002 he went on to win his first gold in the Para-Asian Games.

He was 23 when he won the gold at the 2004 Athens Games. His performance has been quite consistent in the decade after this big win. He won a silver at the 2014 Incheon Para Asian Games.

India's Mariyappan Thangavelu made the country proud by winning the gold medal while compatriot Varun Singh Bhati clinched the bronze in the men's high jump T-42 event at the Rio Paralympics.

The 20-year-old Thangavelu with a great effort soared to a height of 1.89m, which helped him to secure the gold, while Bhati produced a personal best of 1.86m to finish third. USA's Sam Grewe bagged the silver medal.

Thangavelu was injured at the age of five, when a bus accident left him with a permanent disability. Bronze medal winner Bhati was diagnosed with polio which lead to a deformity in his legs.






Shot-putter Deepa Malik created sporting history after becoming the first Indian woman to win a Paralympics medal. She won a silver with an impressive throw of 4.61m (15.12ft) in the F-53 final event in Rio.

Malik was paralysed below her waist in 1999 after undergoing surgery to remove a spinal tumour.

She decided to participate in para sports six years later and took to swimming and javelin throw, winning medals at national and international events.

She also participated in the shot put, winning silver at the World Championships in 2011.





























ough has a new name
-- Stan Wawrinka.
The 31-year-old,
until recently known as 'the
other Swiss', who swung
freely even if fiercely in the

giant shadows of the legendary Roger Federer, is now the owner of a staggering Grand Slam record. Three major finals, three titles.

The last time Wawrinka lost a tour-level final was three summers ago, on grass at s-Hertogenbosch. Since then, the World No.3 -- of the colour-box, clothing collection fame -- has won all 11 finals he has made, snapping up four titles this season.

Wawrinka, who won the US Open last Sunday, says the deeper he goes into the draw, the better he plays.

So much so that the Fab 4 -- World no.1 Novak Djokovic, No.2 Andy Murray, the injured Federer and Spaniard Rafael Nadal – have been forced to expand their elite club to five, making place for the power hitter. Wawrinka, who quite incredibly is now only a Wimbledon short of a career Slam, has worked his way into the fold quietly.

Until the first week of Wimbledon, after winning his first title at Roland Garros, Djokovic was the game's indomitable force. But the holder of all four Grand Slams, the first man to do so since Rod Laver in 1969, hasn't quite been the same since his third-round loss at the All England Club.

The Serb later clarified that his shock

loss was more a mental wobble that had nothing to do with physical issues. 'Private issues', he called them. "I am in a position, like everybody else, we all have private issues," he said. "That (Wimbledon) was the period for me. It happened right there. It was resolved and life is going on like everything else. It was some other thing I was going through privately and nothing linked to the wrist injury. Everything is fine."

Not quite, apparently. The 29-year-old lost in the first round of the Rio Olympics, falling to Juan Martin Del Potro. And in his four-set loss to Wawrinka in the final of the US Open, he seemed a shadow of his razor-sharp self.



Correspondingly Murray, the British No.1 who reunited with the stone-faced legend Ivan Lendl in the summer, has rediscovered the spark in his play, backing his third Grand Slam title with his second Olympic gold. Though he lost nerve and serve in his clash against Kei Nishikori in the US Open, the Scot remains the hottest player on the Tour with his return of serve, the feature of his play.

"I practice my returns a lot. It didn't sort of just happen by chance. My game sort of starts from there," Murray said. "I practice it for 30 minutes every day. A lot of players hit loads of tennis balls, maybe at the end of practice they serve a little bit and return a little bit. Sometimes, those two shots get left out. But, you know, they're the most






important shots in the game, so I practice them a lot."

The World No.2, who lost in the finals of the first two Grand Slams of the year in Melbourne and Paris, offered a refreshing take on failure. "I don't mind failing. Failing's okay, provided you've given your best and put everything into it," the 29-year-old said. "A lot of questions get asked of me after those losses. Failing is not terrible. I put myself in a position all the time in these events to win. Haven't won them all of the time. I've lost a lot of close ones against great players. I learn from my losses. That's what I've done throughout my career."

Murray, whose record in Grand Slam finals is 3-8, said, "The guys that I've been playing against (in Grand Slam finals) -- Djokovic, Federer and Nadal -- have won lots. A lot of people say,





That's just what makes Wawrinka's record so special. While he beat Nadal to win the Australian Open (2014), he beat the world's top gun, Djokovic, to win in Paris (2015) and New York (2016). Stan is indeed the man, at least until he makes a Grand Slam final he can't win.
